Dayton: Ready for Lift-off

The City of Dayton is celebrating two huge “wins” for job growth in Dayton--the new CareSource headquarters building downtown, and the opening of the first building in Tech Town.

These are two exciting examples of what the future holds for Dayton as our leaders focus on attracting and growing businesses in the four economic clusters that hold the key for our region’s success: Aerospace Research and Development; Human Sciences & Health Care; Information Technology and Advanced Materials & Advanced Manufacturing.

Dayton is well on it’s way to success in these growth areas with the opening of the first building in Tech Town’s 30+ acre campus and construction of the second building will begin soon. IDCAST (Institute for Development and Commercialization of Advanced Sensor Technology) is open for business in Tech Town. The University of Dayton Research Institute, the Air Force Research Laboratory, Ohio State University, and Qbase are among the many participating partners.

CareSource Management Group’s new \$55 million headquarters will support the company’s growth from 600 employees to as many as 1,200 employees over the next few years.

In the past five years, Dayton’s economic development programs helped to retain more than 12,000 jobs, create more than 4,100 jobs, and leveraged more than \$434 million in private investments.

Protecting Vital City Services

When Dayton's revenues started to falter and not keep up with the increase in costs for services, the Dayton City Commission led the effort to keep the budget balanced. They developed a set of five principles to guide the city's decision-making.

The first principle is to preserve the City's cash reserve, its emergency savings account. This protects our bond rating and lowers the interest rate when we borrow money to make large investments in the City.

Investing in the future is the second principle, making sure our bridges, streets, and buildings are maintained. It costs a lot more to rebuild something than it does to maintain it.

The third principle is to use technology to make workers more efficient. As examples, new waste collection trucks allow smaller crews to pick up trash across the city and new accounting software allows fewer workers to maintain the City's records.



A fourth principle is to focus on priorities. Public Safety (police officers on the streets), community development (rehabbing houses, demolishing nuisance structures, and waste collection) and infrastructure (investing in transportation and neighborhood assets) are our core service priorities.

Partnering with others to provide services most efficiently is the fifth principle. Dayton provides fire fleet maintenance services for the region and joined with the County and

other jurisdictions in a regional dispatch facility. Dayton collects trash for two other communities and contracts out some park maintenance to Five Rivers MetroParks.

These principles have guided the Commission in making the best of some very tough choices. Going forward, the Dayton City Commission continues to work to position Dayton for success.

Important Info for Election Day...

Voters must bring identification with them to the polls. Identification may include one of the following:

- a current and valid state issued photo ID card or Military ID
- copy of a utility bill, bank statement, paycheck, government check or government document showing your name and current address.

Voters who do not provide this identification will still be allowed to vote by provisional ballot by providing the last 4 digits of their Social Security Number.

Voters who do not have ID and do not know the last 4 digits of their SS number can still vote with a provisional ballot by signing an affirmation swearing to the voter's identity.

Building Excellence: Dayton Public Schools

Yvonne Isaacs, Joe Lacey, Ronald Lee and Stacy Thompson are experienced leaders in education reform and deserve to be re-elected to the Dayton School Board. Under their leadership, academic scores continue to rise; more dollars are spent on classroom instruction; attendance exceeds 92% and graduation rates have risen from 50% to 83.1%.

The school district's building program continues to progress on-time and on-budget. Fifteen new schools have opened in neighborhoods across Dayton, becoming anchors in their community, and twelve additional schools are in various stages of construction.

After hiring Dr. Kurt Stanic as Superintendent, they collectively wrote a new Strategic Plan and entered into a contract with the community, committing to continue the progress in Dayton Public Schools.
